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SAUSSI BACK

SID JAMES ON TELEVISION by Peter Tatchell

Y the mid 1950s, South African-born Sidney James had become a familiar face in British movies. Usually cast as a rough diamond he appeared in dozens of films as army sergeants, criminal types and any other nuggety down-to-earth roles on offer. His performance in the classic Ealing comedy The Lavender Hill Mob lead to a part in the BBC radio series Hancock's Half Hour in 1954.

When the show transferred to television two years later he became the star's chief foil and by the end of the decade Tony and Sid were widely regarded as the leading comedy duo in Britain. A year later the pair split (so Hancock could pursue a more realistic vein of humour) and James' future seemed somewhat uncertain.

H.H.H. writers Galton and Simpson continued on with Sid's East Cheam characterisation in a spinoff series called Citizen James, with Bill Kerr, Liz Fraser and Sydney Tafler added to the cast. Two follow-up seasons (scripted by Sid Green and Dick Hills) featured only James and Tafler in a further twenty-six episodes.

By now Sid's movie roles were primarily in comedy productions (he'd made the first of nineteen Carry On appearances in 1960 with Carry On Constable) but by 1963 the BBC signed him for a more dramatic role in Taxi. Cast as a London cabbie, the series touched on the grimier side of life with storylines involving robbery, runaways and attempted suicide.

James had his own touch of drama in early 1967 when he suffered a serious heart attack but after several months of enforced rest he was able to resume work.

His fourth television venture saw him pitted against onetime Larkins motormouth Peggy Mount in A.T.V.'s George And The Dragon, playing chauffeur to her cook in the household of a retired colonel (John Le Mesurier a couple of years before Dad's Army). The show proved a popular favourite and ran to four series.

Barely three months after it concluded, Sid was appearing in Two In Clover for ITV's new Thames Television. He and Victor Spinetti played a couple of city-types who decide to leave the rat race and run a farm. Somewhat inspired by Green Acres in the U.S., it wasn't able to repeat that show's success on the other side of the Atlantic though it did have a second

Thames and James were luckier with their next production ... Sid's first family-based sitcom Bless This House which saw him playing a mellower, more responsible character than any of his earlier efforts. The series became a regular on the schedules for six years and over sixty episodes, and eventually inspired a motion picture spinoff.

The situation was reversed when the successful Carry On movies led to a handful of Christmas specials on television and later a 13-part series called Carry On Laughing in 1975. Sid took part in many of these in between his other regular

He was also busy in live theatre with the stage production Carry On London in 1974 and later a farce called The Mating Season (in which he toured Australia and around the Brit-

It was during a performance of the show he collapsed and died in 1976.

THE BURKISS WAY

NE of the most obscure British radio shows, *The Burkiss Way* is paradoxically one of the very best. Running for five series on BBC Radio 4 from 1976 to 1980, it was full of jokes, tricks, imagination and cleverness. Its origins can be traced back to an Open University spoof on highbrow Radio 3. *The Half-Open University* presented various skits representing lectures, introduced by a professor who established an unusual rapport with his distant students: 'Stop sniggering, Perkins of the Upper Clyde.' The show was innovative and the potential for a series apparent. The following year, producer Simon Brett took the writers and cast for a short journey up the dial and a surrealist classic began.

The stars were originally Denise Coffey, Nigel Rees, Chris Emmett and Fred Harris, but after the first series Jo Kendall (of *I'm Sorry, I'll Read That Again* fame) took over Denise's rôle. Perhaps more famous than the cast are the main writers, Andrew Marshall (a friend of Douglas Adams' and consequently the inspiration for Marvin, the paranoid android in *The Hitch-Hiker's Guide To The Galaxy*) and bearded David Renwick. A few others contributed to odd shows, including Adams, whose sketch from the Cambridge Footlights about a repeatedly unsuccessful kamikaze pilot was included in the 18th episode. The shows were initially produced by Simon Brett (of Stepney), later by John Lloyd (of Europe) and David Hatch (of the BBC).

Originally the show took the form of radio's first correspondence course, early editions including testimonials from satisfied customers: 'I used to be a weedy, gutless and insignificant apology for a human being. Men would push me aside in the street and punch me on the nose and knock my head off and saw my stomach up... and it started to get me down. Then a friend introduced me to The Burkiss Way and immediately it changed my life. After just two weeks of the Burkiss course in sado-masochism, I now enjoy having my head knocked off and my stomach sawn up.' The course was run by its founder, Professor Emil Burkiss, and offered help for those lacking in self-confidence: 'Mention the name Fiona Smoth in Shepherds Bush and people just laugh. "She's stupid", they say. "She's ugly, untalented and a complete social failure". But do I care? No. Because as you look at me today I am a different woman. I am Doris Spedding of Bayswater, and one of the people who laugh at Fiona Smoth. And I owe it all to The Burkiss Way.'

Radio listeners were offered everything they'd ever desired: 'Ladies, would you like to have power over men? Try Burkiss naughty underwear. The new inflatable temptress bra with the peek-a-boo fluorescent shoulder straps and the incredible seductress revolving silk knickers with reversible lace thigh enhancers. Yes, photograph him in these and he'll do anything to get the negatives.' The benefits were manifold: 'The Burkiss Way showed me how to become the sort of man who's made love to more women than he's had hot dinners. All I have to do is eat regularly in British Rail buffets.'

The course offered was in 'dynamic living', a buzz-word of the late '70's. Each episode was billed in the Radio Times with a 'lesson' number, and a title which gave a rough theme for skits. Thus *Gain Spiritual Fulfilment The Burkiss Way* has items of a religious nature ('Being in church is not a time to

sit and stare at the knees of the girl in the adjoining pew. It's a time to think of higher things.') and Get Off With Life The Burkiss Way is tainted with a legal flavour. The latter replaces Be Patient The Burkiss Way, which is postponed for four weeks, and sees The Burkiss Way arrested for contravening §14 of the BBC Charter, on trial on three charges of 'being funny'—'Legal representatives for our listeners have advised us to plead "not guilty"'. One of these charges concerns the joke told in an earlier show: 'We're omitting the reference to Nicholas Parsons' brain transplant and how the monkey is struggling for recovery, because we don't want to get any cheap laughs at his expense'. The judge asks the counsel for the defence how he wishes to plead—'in semaphore, in crab language or in grand opera?'

Later, as the shows got wilder and the themes became less obvious, they were even making things difficult for archivists. Lessons 31 and 32 were combined into one half hour, with Lesson 32 supposedly the start of a new series! The following week's show, The Last Burkiss Way, wasn't, and seven days later, The Next To Last Burkiss Way, which was the last in the series had cheeky references to 'next week's show'. Is Britain Going The Burkiss Way? was split across two weeks (Lessons 37 and 38), and split mid-sentence, naturally. The titles even became unmanageable: Lesson 45 was entitled Write extremely long titles with lots and lots of words in, like this, so that the RADIO TIMES will have to allot more space than the measly half a centimetre of billing space we usually get and at least it'll look a bit more prominent on the page, although nowhere near the 50 column inches they give to The Hitch-Hiker's Guide To The Galaxy *The Burkiss Way*. But the ultimate trick was to include two Lesson 39's, both appropriately titled Repeat Yourself The Burkiss Way. The second of these began as a re-run of the first for more than a minute, proceeding with a new episode after an apology that the wrong tape had been loaded.

The challenge for Marshall and Renwick was to come up with an innovative new format for the series. Post-Python, a half-hour collection of unrelated sketches with clearly defined beginnings and endings no longer seemed revolutionary. The Burkiss Way approach saw sketches running into each other, taking different, unexpected tacks—a sketch with General Custer launching his attack of Bob Hope-type gags on Chief Sitting Bull's braves at Little Bighorn, turns out to be a film extract played at a special tribute night being held at the Talk Of The Town nightclub. Sitting Bull is one of the many massmurderers and butchers who have gathered for a special evening to honour Genghis Khan's eight hundred years in slaughterbiz. Often the show repeatedly returns to an earlier sketch, but always in a logical fashion. The last edition of 1977 starts with a favourite target—the tacky quiz show. This one is 'The Dinosaur Cheese Interlude', in which contestants have great difficulty satisfying the requirements of the game—answering questions without mentioning a type of cheese or a species of dinosaur. Most don't seem to be able to get further than giving their names. Subsequent sketches are brought to an abrupt halt when a character unintentionally says 'cheddar' or 'stegosaurus'. A later episode centres around a Roald Dahl's



Tales Of The Unexpected send-up ('starring Chubbie Checker with no clothes on as the rather unpleasant twist'), with a stranger on a train inviting a lady to play a Russian Roulette video game. A cassette is proffered, containing five blank run-of-the-mill TV shows and the deadly component—a neverending tape of Radio 4 UK. They begin after tossing a British Rail salad to see who starts ('Your call'—'Snails'—'Snails it is!'), each play of the tape launching a different skit.

Amongst the various and assorted characters produced by the versatile cast, a few regulars emerged. One was the world's most important Jewish impresario, Lord Russian-Emigré, with his characteristic big cigar and entourage of 'yes men'—a close relation to Bernard Delfont or Lew Grade. He could be found in his natural office habitat, barking orders into the intercom: 'Max, get me the man who handles the Nolan sisters and tell him it's ruining their image. Next, get me their image and use it to disinfect the drains. Then go into my bathroom and take down the mirror. I never see myself without an appointment.' His Lordship was the man responsible for bringing the film version of the mathematical numbers system to our screens, and the television series about the nativity, starring Fred Astaire and Ginger Rogers as the Three Kings. But star billing was reserved for Chris Emmett's snivelling, grimy, little toerag, Eric Pode of Croydon, who could pop up at any time midsketch. He became the subject of short interview in most shows, his replies a collection of amusing one-liners ('I nicked that one off Bob Monkhouse'-'Now there's a switch'). In Lesson 45 it turns out he has been performing professionally: 'I see you're playing somewhere rather interesting at the moment.'— 'No, I was just getting me handkerchief out.' He is even contemplating matrimony: 'My new girlfriend is expecting a little one. I don't think she'll be disappointed.' In the last *Burkiss*, Mr. Croydon makes public his plans to move into a new line of work-carrying out vasectomies on goats. No kidding.

One of the most striking qualities of *The Burkiss Way* is the wealth of comic ideas. Not only is there a show which finishes very early—continuing with an old film—and a show which supposedly starts 25 minutes late (Lesson 12: *Make Short Comedy Programmes The Burkiss Way*), but there is another which begins with the closing credits, continues with Dean Martin's drunken sign-off—'Goodnight from dynamic

livers everywhere'—and is then interrupted with an apology that the show appears to be running backwards. Sadly, in Lesson 22 there is an accident—the show is dropped, shattering into many fragments. These are hastily reassembled as well as can be expected under the circumstances, however continuity suffers somewhat. Marshall and Renwick also experimented with false endings (sometimes giving false information about next week's programmes!) and making things difficult and embarrassing for the BBC Radio 4 continuity announcer following the show. Sometimes film concepts were transferred to radio—Lesson 13 presents the Cinemascope version of 'Mutiny On The Bounty', entitled 'Tiny On The Bount' since all the beginnings and endings of sentences won't fit on the small screen wireless. In Lesson 23, stunt men are brought on to deliver sketch punch-lines ('Well, would you dare say it?').

In February 1977, *The Burkiss Way* became the subject of *This Is Your Life*. Eamonn Andrews sets up the ruse by disguising himself as a joke ('There — that didn't take long') and hides on page three of the script. The show is taken on a trip down memory lane, from birth ('Congratulations sir, it's a BBC comedy!') to early achievements: 'Do you remember this laugh? Yes, it was the very first laugh you ever got—way back on show eleven'. A straight man from an early sketch recalls behind-the-scenes problems. Finally, the closing signature tune has been flown in from New South Wales, and the credits are read in an Aussie accent.

Despite their fondness for unconventionality, the writers did not eschew good old-fashioned jokes. Some were of a very high standard, but unfortunately we only have space for the one about the American gambler, who in two hours had collected over 2,000 G's—it was the worst game of scrabble he'd ever had. Or the one about the poor young gravedigger who was struggling to bring up a family of four, when his shovel broke. Or maybe we can just squeeze in the one about the man who is unemployed because he can't keep a job down, on a strict diet because he can't keep his food down and has sixteen children. Above all, the show never took itself seriously—sketches featured characters called 'Mr. Funnylines' or 'Mr. Differentperson' & 'Mr. Sameperson', and a *South Bank Show* parody was introduced by 'a man squeezing his nose in order to sound like Melvyn Bragg.'

The team had fun with their versions of other radio and TV programmes. The impersonations of personalities from The Archers' Walter Gabriel to interviewer Michael Parkinson are generally surprisingly accurate. The Burkiss Way presented their interpretations of Just A Minute, A Book At Bedtime, Blakes 7, Top Of The Pops, World of Sport, the Carry On films, wartime ITMA and Dick Barton—Special Agent. Some included unlikely guests—Arthur C. Clarke on Does The Team Think and Genghis Khan popped up on both The Old Grey Whistle Test and The Mongols From The Ministry. However, in Lesson 41 (broadcast on the 26th December 1979 and naturally titled Eric Pode of Croydon's Easter Special), the real Peter Jones hit back. After a false ending, familiar space music faded up and Jones began reading in a familiar fashion: 'Somewhere in the shady part of the Milky Way, just outside a small bluish star orbited by a few damp planets of dubiously desirable habitation, there is a tiny holein the electromagnetic airspace. To plug this void in the continuum, the inscrutable monoliths of the collapsing star system of Radio 4 Light Entertainment occasionally employ a tiny imperceptible device known as The Burkiss Way. The Hitch-Hiker's Guide To The Galaxy defines this as "a programme of infinite tedium, which gets cheap laughs by doing pathetic parodies of other much more successful shows. Its impressions are notoriously unrecognisable. This one, for instance, sounds absolutely nothing like me. And as if that weren't bad enough, it invariably ends in a silly fashion, just when you least..." Needless to say, the show breaks off at this point.

A few items later surfaced in other shows, strangely in better versions than the originals, largely due to thorough rewriting. A Mastermind parody with the contestant answering one question behind each time was expanded into a very funny and clever spot for *The Two Ronnies*. A sketch from Lesson 23 set in a modern hi-fi shop, with an old-fashioned, timid man trying to buy a 'gramophone' from a smartarse young salesman, cropped up in the 1980 series of *Not The Nine O'Clock News*, performed by Mel Smith and Rowan Atkinson.

In 1981, a hardback book of the show, by Marshall & Renwick, was published by George Allen & Unwin under the title Bestseller! It purported to be a collection of the life works of Eric Pode found in a strong-box by the Controller of Programmes at Anglia Television. It consisted of diary entries, school tests, published stories, advertisements and submitted radio/TV scripts (together with the inevitable letters of rejection). Most of these works were taken from the radio scripts and novelised or even put into cartoon form! However there were also original items. One was a Painting By Numbers picture depicting an outline of a sexily-posed naked woman, but with every area marked to be coloured white. The picture's caption read 'Christmas Snow Scene'.

Post-Burkiss, the writers moved on to an LWT political comedy series, *Whoops Apocalypse* (a whimsical coverage of Armageddon), which also became a book, a film and a scented nasal spray. This began an association with Alexei Sayle, and his BBC-TV series, *Stuff*, which is probably the closest we'll get to a televisual *Burkiss Way*. Spike Milligan, being a *Burkiss* fan, invited Marshall and Renwick to contribute to his 1982 TV series, *There's A Lot Of It About*. More recently they have been working separately on different sitcoms—Marshall on *Two Point Four Children* and Renwick on *One Foot In The Grave*, and together on *If You See God, Tell Him*. Which only goes to prove what dynamic living can do for one.

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Dancing in the Moonlight

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A GUIDE TO AUSTRALIAN TV COMEDY IN THE 1980s

by Paul Balsillie

HE early 1980s saw a resurgence of sketch comedy on Australian television. The driving forces were performers and writers who got their start doing standup comedy at small time Melbourne cafes or appearing in university revues. They progressed through several experimental formats which attracted cult followings, before graduating to public acceptance with such shows as The Comedy Company and Fast Forward. Along the way, a number of sitcoms also appeared, though with less success. Herewith a rundown of the shows, the performers and the merchandising ...

RATBAGS (10)

series 1: Jun 2 to Aug 25 1981 (13 x 60m)

Cast: Rod Quantock, Mary Kenneally, Adam Bowen, Joanne Samuel, Micki Gardener, John Derum.

Owing to network in-fighting, the programme was hardly seen outside Sydney. Features included Cooking with Mars Bars (Derum), Superperson (feminist serial) and comments by leading pop, sporting and political figures.



MICHAEL FLANDERS AND DONALD SWANN

HE purpose of satire", said Michael Flanders in the introduction to At The Drop Of Another Hat, "is to strip off the veneer of comforting illusion and cozy half-truth. And our job, as I see it, is to put it back again." He and Donald Swann took to their task with vigour, playing to enthusiastic audiences around the world for ten years, and, thanks to the foresight of Parlophone records, their performances continue to delight listeners.

It all began in 1939, when Flanders and Swann, at school together, collaborated on a revue called **Go To It**. It was really Flanders' show, with Swann providing only the piano accompaniment. The show later moved to The Everyman Theatre in Hampstead, but soon closed due to the blitz.

Flanders was called up and joined the navy, serving on a destroyer. A career as an officer was curtailed by an attack of polio in 1943. Swann, meanwhile, joined the Friend's Ambulance Unit as a conscientious objector.

Having finished defending the British Isles, Flanders turned to broadcasting, an occupation he continued for much of the rest of his life, whilst Swann returned to music studies. Finding music very much at the forefront of his life, Swann contacted Flanders and they formed a partnership; Flanders supplying the words, which were set to music by Swann.

In 1948 Swann renewed acquaintance with revue producer Laurier Lister (whom he had known at Oxford), and the pair contributed *In The D'Oyley Cart* to his 1948 production, **Oranges And Lemons**. The success of this led to contributions to Lister's following revues, **Penny Plain**, **Airs On A Shoestring** and **Fresh Airs**.

At this stage, their material was being performed by others, such as Max Adrian and Joyce Grenfell. An exception to this was in 1950, when they hired the Whistler Ballroom, and performed some of their new songs themselves. It was the beginning of a performing relationship.

In 1956, the pair were invited to the Darlington School Of Music to help demonstrate the art of revue writing. Flanders introduced the songs with the spoken preamble that would become the linking monologue in **At The Drop Of A Hat**.

Finding that the links were being as well received as the songs, Flanders and Swann decided to dispense with the lecture and put on the remainder in concert. They hired a small theatre, The New Lindsey, for a week, and with little fanfare, on the last day of 1956, **At The Drop Of A Hat** began. Word got around about the show, and audiences began to pick up. The run was extended to three weeks, before moving to the larger Fortune Theatre, where they stayed for over two years.

The show was very simple in its staging: one man at a piano, the other in a wheelchair, a standard lamp and a hat. Thus the audience was able to concentrate on what was being said, and sung, rather than on fancy costumes and backdrops. The shows were mainly made up of revue style songs, performed by the pair, linked by Flanders' monologue. However, within this framework, both performers took time out to present their own items. Flanders had his extended monologue sketches, such as the introduction to *The Gnu*, *Greensleeves*, *By Air* and *Tried By The Centre Court*. Swann performed songs in a variety of languages, such as French (*Je*

Suis Le Tenebreux), Russian (In The Desert), and Greek (Kokoraki). This last also involved a certain amount of visual humour, with Flanders wheeling himself forward when he thinks the song is over, and is horrified to discover that it continues for verse after verse. It also demonstrates Swann's adopted characterisation for the show: that of a musically brilliant polyglot with a childlike, naive side, thinking the Madeira song was about cake, for example.

That Flanders and Swann included such material indicated that they treated their audience as being more intelligent than revue audiences were often judged. They included jokes on archaic English punctuation (*Greensleeves*), and the occasional joke in Latin, for example, pointing out that often in cases of political scandal, there is no smoke without fire: nil conbustibus pro fumo (referring to the later Profumo scandal).

The show was recorded for posterity, twice, by Parlophone. The first release was made early in 1957, at the beginning of **At The Drop Of A Hat**. This mono LP (PMC 1033) was also released in the USA (Angel 65042), although it would be several years before the pair actually played there. Four more tracks, which had been recorded at the same time as the LP, were re-recorded in the studio for issue on an EP (GEP 8636).

A second recording was made on the show's final night, but this time in stereo. The UK version (PCS 3001) has almost the same track selection as the earlier mono disc, but leaves out *Kokoraki*, a suitable recording being unavailable. A stereo version was finally made in 1963 (during a performance of **At The Drop Of Another Hat**) and included in most re-issues. There was greater difference in the USA release (Angel 35797), which features three new tracks, whilst other tracks have been edited down or deleted altogether.


After the Fortune, the show moved to the USA, where another long run began on the 8th of October, 1959 at the Nine O'Clock Theatre in New York, followed by a tour across the USA and then to Switzerland. Returning to England, the pair took a year's rest from performing and touring to write more material, and record another album.

The new record, **The Bestiary Of Flanders And Swann** (PCS 3026), differed from the previous ones in that it was recorded in a studio without an audience. Here they presented some of the animal songs from **At The Drop Of A Hat**, and others which had also been made famous by Ian Wallace. An EP was also extracted from the LP, and the album was issued in the USA (on Angel S 36112), minus the last track, *The Wompom* (which had been issued in the USA as one of the extra tracks on the **At The Drop Of A Hat** record).

Flanders and Swann returned to touring, taking the show around England before settling in at the Haymarket Theatre, London, from the 2nd of October 1963. Titled **At The Drop Of Another Hat**, the new show ran for almost a year. Another live LP (PCS 3052) was recorded early on in the run, featuring much of the new material. A further three tracks were released on an EP (GEP 8900).

Once again the show went on tour, this time to Australia and New Zealand, featuring a selection of material from both shows, then across the USA again before settling in on Broadway on the last day of 1966.

Flanders and Swann had avoided television throughout the run of the Hats, aside from the occasional guest performance.



However, there were two presentations in the UK; an hour length programme in 1961, based on **At The Drop Of A Hat**, and another hour on the 30th of April 1968, featuring songs from **At The Drop Of Another Hat**. The entire Broadway show was recorded in colour in 1967, running to two hours. Unfortunately, only the second half of this show is known to exist at the present; it has been released as **The Only Flanders And Swann Video** and represents the only known surviving visual record of the shows.

The Broadway show was the end of the Hats. The parting was amicable; Flanders and Swann decided that ten years was enough and they wished to pursue separate projects. A few ideas were tossed about for a third show, to be titled **Hat Trick**, but they came to nothing.

This was not to be the end of their performing career, however. Flanders and Swann got back together for BBC Radio to record a show telling the story of their collaboration before **At The Drop Of A Hat**. This was "And Then We Wrote... A Review Of Reviews", and was broadcast on Radio 4 on Christmas Eve, 1974. Songs from **Oranges And Lemons**, **Penny Plain**, **Airs On A Shoestring** and **Fresh Airs** were dusted down and performed with the help of Julian Orchard, Pat Lancaster, Charlotte Mitchell and Anne Rogers. The show was issued by EMI on an LP, EMCM 3088.

This was their last public performance; Michael Flanders died in April 1975. However, fans who thought that this meant no more new Hat material were wrong, as EMI released an LP, **Tried By The Centre Court** (EMI NTS 116), made up of material recorded privately by audience members, which was tweaked up by the EMI engineers, and the material unique to the EPs from the 60s (although the four tracks from **At The Drop Of A Hat** are taken from the 1957 live recording session and not the studio remakes for the EP). Donald Swann passed away after a battle with cancer in March 1994.

In 1991, the entire Flanders And Swann canon was rereleased on CD, with the four albums spread over three CDs. The box set also included a 36 page booklet explaining the many topical references. After nearly four decades in the catalogues, the records of Flanders and Swann still remain, as Flanders once said, "a jolly nice noise".



SHELLEY BERMAN

HE album "Inside Shelley Berman" marked a breakthrough in the history of recorded comedy. It was the first to sell over a million copies and resulted in the long-play disc becoming the chief medium for collectors to access performances by the top comedy names over the next three decades.

Thirty-four-year-old Berman had graduated from a Chicago improvisational group to stand-up comic with a series of clever routines about the problems of everyday life and the frustrations we all face. Telephone conversations with such antagonists as doctors, receptionists, sales assistants and children figure largely in his work and the public was quick to identify with the neuroses and irritations he presented.

Berman's half a dozen releases of the early 1960s offer a consistancy of quality material and paved the way for other examiners of the human condition Bob Newhart, Bill Cosby and Woody Allen.
