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GEORGE BURNS

Part 3: SOLO CAREER

N a drizzly day in March the team of Burns and Allen were at last reunited. With the passing of George Burns at the age of 100 he joined his beloved Gracie at Forest Lawn Cemetery and an era of show business came to a close.

For a quarter of a century he'd joked about giving a centenary concert but, just when the unbelievable seemed possible, ill health and the aging process finally robbed him of his quest to repay the adulation of several generations of adoring fans.

A debilitating fall (and subsequent surgery) two years earlier had curtailed his performing, and celebrations for the long-awaited January 20th birthday were subdued when it was realised he would not be well enough to leave his sick bed. Two months later the old trouper took his final curtain call.

It was an anticlimactic end to a remarkably successful career in just about every field of show business but as his long-time manager Irving Fein noted "he often said he knew entrances and exits.. last Saturday he knew it was time to go".

How many would have envisaged his popularity enduring for so long after the retirement of his legendary wife almost forty years before. To be fair, the first decade or so relied heavily on earlier triumphs, but by the mid-1970s George Burns was delighting a whole new generation of fans who'd never seen him work with Gracie.

When (under doctor's orders, it's now been revealed) she was forced to abandon performing in 1958, George arranged for the team from their highly-successful television show to continue on in a spinoff series. It was not a success ... the pivotal role was missing, and within weeks the format was revamped. Instead of a traditional sitcom (with the occasional guest star) live variety shows were hastily substituted to retain viewers. By the end of the season, **The George Burns Show** was cancelled and its star was forced to retreat to live performances at Las Vegas and the occasional television special. Behind the scenes, his production company was responsible for several projects, among them the hit series **Mister Ed**.

In the early sixties he teamed with Broadway star Carol Channing in a continuation of the double act format, before eventually deciding to perform on his own, regaling audiences with fanciful anecdotes from his colourful past.

By 1964 George prepared to return to television in a weekly sitcom centred around the antics of a slightly dotty housewife. The lead role in **Wendy And Me** went to ex-**Hawaiian Eye** star Connie Stevens, with Burns appearing as the owner of the apartment block where she lived with her airline pilot husband. In the tradition of his earlier show, George would also step out of the plot and talk directly to the viewing audience.

Just weeks before the show's September premiere, tragedy struck ... Gracie Allen died. Her health had been failing but she had managed to visit the set to the delight of the production team, and had been in the audience at Las Vegas where Burns and Stevens had been trying out some repartee. George was devastated, but the old "show must go on" adage was put to the test and Wendy And Me appeared as scheduled.

Unfortunately (despite having a certain charm, and some likeable characters) it was all too reminiscent of the earlier programme, and indeed several scripts from the predecessor were reworked along the way. It survived just one season.

George was back to hosting roles in shows like Holly-wood Palace and The Kraft Music Hall, but his television career was on a downward spiral. By the early 1970s he was working less and less, when out of the blue he was signed to return to the movies after a thirty-seven year break.

Neil Simon had written a play called **The Sunshine Boys** and it was decided Burns and best friend Jack Benny would be ideal in the lead roles of two over-the-hill vaudevillians. The pair had been buddies for over fifty years and Jack had only recently made an appearance to introduce George's stage show.

With filming about to begin, fate stepped in and Burns (by then in his late seventies) needed urgent heart surgery. Walter Matthau was signed to replace him, before the production suffered a second more devastating blow ... Jack Benny was diagnosed with inoperable cancer, and given weeks to live.

His death at the end of 1974 was a tragic loss for George personally, but the resultant delays with filming meant he was now well enough to rejoin the production (this time in Benny's role). His performance in the picture gained enormous public and critical acclaim, and eventually an Oscar for best supporting actor at the Academy Awards.

George Burns at age 80 was back in the big time. Offers for more motion pictures were negotiated, television networks quickly signed him for specials and even his vocal talents (which had been the butt of many jokes over the years) were sought after by record producers.

In 1977 he played the title role in the movie **Oh, God!** and his personification of the almighty resulted in more accolades, and two sequels. There appeared to be no slowing down of the Burns career throughout the 1980s as he continued to appear in films and tv specials.

In his 90th year he was offered another challenge ... to host a series of one-off comedy playlets for television under the title **The George Burns Comedy Week**. Despite being cancelled mid-season, it boasted an impressive line-up of talent (one episode was directed by Steve Martin).

George's tenth decade continued on with more specials and records until he suffered an unfortunate bathtub fall and was hospitalised for surgery. It was the start of his decline and though he was seen at the naming of George Burns Road and Gracie Allen Boulevard (standing at the corner of "Burns and Allen"), his performing days were over.

His last professional appearance was in late 1995 when he agreed to say one line in a television commercial to promote the centenary of Australian Rules football on the other side of the globe. Surrounded by chorus girls he remarked "A game as old as me ... I'd like to see that!". At the suggestion of his manager (who sensed George might not survive until the campaign launch six months later) he secretly filmed another take ... "A game that's lasted longer than me, I'd like to see that!".

And with one last laugh from beyond the grave, George Burns left the stage and entered the history books.

RUTLAND WEEKEND TELEVISION

HEN Monty Python finished in 1974, the various members of that team went on to solo projects. John Cleese made the classic Fawlty Towers, whilst Michael Palin and Terry Jones collaborated on Ripping Yarns. While both of those shows have been freely available on video, in script form and with repeats on television, Eric Idle's effort, Rutland Weekend Television, has remained relatively obscure.

Rutland Weekend Television purported to be the smallest television station in Britain, and its programming certainly reflected that achievement. The feel of the programme was helped by it being produced by the BBC's Presentation Department, usually responsible for the trailers for upcoming episodes and the like. As a result, the shows were shot in a very small studio indeed, without an audience. An upshot of this was that jokes could also be included in the "hand-over" from BBC-2 to RWT, and indeed in the second show RWT handed back to the ITV station ATV, complete with ATV's logo.

Along with Eric Idle, who also wrote the scripts, the shows featured ex-Bonzo Dog (Doo-Dah) Band member Neil Innes and his songs, plus David Battley and Henry Woolf. The end of the third show was notable for including Idle's mother, who bore a close resemblance to Mary Whitehouse, the clean up TV campaigner, being interviewed while sitting in a bath. George Harrison guested in the 1975 Christmas special, appearing from time to time and complaining that Idle won't let him do a sketch as a pirate. Finally his time comes, but as the introduction to *My Sweet Lord* plays, Harrison bursts into *The Pirate Song* ("I like to be a pirate / A pirate's life for me / All my friends are pirates / And they sail the BB Sea.")

The shows in the first series (which, logically enough, were screened on Mondays) were each linked by an on screen continuity announcer. In the first programme this was Eric Idle as a gushing announcer almost taking part in a noisy, off-screen party. In later shows, Henry Woolf slowly turned into a woman whilst giving completely irrelevant links ("Well, Nude Religion brings to a close our programmes for today"), and Neil Innes complained about the lack of budget as his clothing was repossessed. In the second series, the sketches were linked by such groups as The Razor Blade Four (a barbershop quartet), and the Ricochett Brothers (spelt rick-o-shaw, but pronounced rick-o-chett).

The sketches were mainly, but not always, in the style of television programmes. Thus viewers were treated to documentaries about soldiers still fighting World War II on the Isle Of Wight; the making of Bathtime Theatre, where all the plays are set in baths; private prisons which were run by suburban housewives; and a safari car park which had the animals in the cars. There was the interview conducted entirely in gibberish ("Tonight, sampan Bombay Bermuda in diptheria, rustic McAlpine splendour, rabbit and phut-phut phooey jugs

rapidly big biro rule liners musk greengages micturate, with nipples and tiptoe rustling machinery, rustically inclined. Good evening and welcome."), and a poem about wifeswapping in the style of Stanley Holloway.

Rutland Weekend Television expanded on the earlier Python practice of having sketches blend into one another and mutate as they went along. A sketch which starts in a condemned cell transforms when the prisoner escapes through a priest and the warders chase him. This leads to a discussion on hobbies such as sitting under clerics, saving fish from drowning, and people who push sailors into shops. In another instance, the characters in a sketch with poor continuity consult a film doctor about the problem, which leads to a case of recursive flashbacks.

There are many other wonderful ideas, such as Uri Geller bending, a beauty queen farm, giving women as Christmas presents, angels going on strike and demonstrating in front of the Pearly Gates, and a man who has the bad habit of killing people. But the idea most important in terms of future developments appeared in the first show of the second series when, in a sketch about finding a cure for love, a group called The Rutles were shown performing *I Must Be In Love*. This clip was shown on the American TV programme Saturday Night Live when Idle was hosting (2 Oct 1976), and viewer response lead to a 70 minute special being made about the Rutles.

All You Need Is Cash tells the Rutles' story, which parallels that of the Beatles, but has the advantage of being funnier. The cast included Idle as Dirk McQuickly, Neil Innes as Ron Nasty, Rikki Fataar as Stig O'Hara and John Halsey as Barry Wom; these were the Rutles, the Pre-Fab Four: the group that made the sixties what they are today — gone. Also appearing were Dan Aykroyd, John Belushi and Gilda Radner from the SNL team (as the show was a British/American co-production), Michael Palin and George Harrison. Innes also wrote a number of pastiches of Beatles songs; fourteen of these were released on record in 1978, complete with a lavish booklet full of photos from the special. The record was reissued on CD in 1990 with six extra tracks. The special itself is also available on video.

But whilst **The Rutles** has been freely available, material from **Rutland Weekend Television** has been hard to come by. A record, since deleted, was issued in 1976, and contains studio remakes of a few sketches and some of Innes' songs. The Rutland Dirty Weekend Book, published in 1975, also reworks the TV material, and the tome is notable for having pages of different textures suitable to the material it is satirizing. But as to the TV series itself; it seems that it was never repeated in the UK, and was not shown anywhere else. A video release was planned but later shelved. The only public exposure in recent years has been a compilation edition for Christmas 1993. Hopefully, however, someone will see the wisdom of making this neglected series available, and we can once again tune in to **Rutland Weekend Television**.

THE NAKED VICAR SHOW



Y the mid-1970s, Australian sketch comedy had all but disappeared from television. The glory days of Mavis (and her various clones) were gone and there was nothing to prick the sacred cows of politics and the local entertainment scene. On radio, humour had long been relegated to one-liners in the breakfast session, but things were set to change.

The catalyst was the introduction (on January 19th 1975) of the A.B.C.'s progressive new rock station 2JJ, aimed primarily at the under-25s. In amongst the jocks and muzos, management decided to add a sprinkling of humour and signed such names as Graham Bond, Rory O'Donohue and Gary McDonald (from Aunty Jack), Mavis alumnus Noeline Brown and a stable of lesser-known performers and writers to produce a series of bogus commercials and segments.

One of the station's early successes was the breakfast show serial called **Chuck Chunder** (starring Brown, Roger Newcombe, Alan McGirvan and voiceover veteran Ross Higgins). Somewhat akin to Kenny Everett's **Kremmen Of The Star Corps**, it ran for over 200 three-minute episodes with scripts by advertising copywriters Gary Reilly and Tony Sattler. The pair also wrote the serial **Doctors And Nurses** for JJ (again, with Noeline Brown).

By the year's end, Reilly and Sattler had decided to expand their comedy talents to writing and producing a series of half-hour broadcasts to be called **The Naked Vicar Show**, which would feature Brown and Higgins and another well-known commercial voice Kev Golsby. Inspiration for the title apparently came from a brief news item about a naked bishop who had been found on the steps of a Parisian brothel coupled with the popularity of a book titled *The Naked Stranger*.

The first two editions were recorded in front of an invited audience five days before Christmas 1975 and RS Productions were on their way to a decade of multi-media success.

The programme's format was a mixture of over-the-top sketches and satirical digs at popular television shows, commercials and political figures, interspersed with guest pop vocalists. It wasn't long before newly-elected prime-minister Malcolm Fraser and controversial Queensland premier Jo Bjelke-Petersen became regular targets.

An A.B.C. technician agreed to remove his clothing and be photographed for publicity shots as the "naked vicar", although Ross Higgins took the role of the recalcitrant reverend in the opening segment of each broadcast. The vicar was just one of a gallery of colourful characters who inhabited the series throughout its twenty-six episode run on A.B.C. radio.

Audience favourites included the dentally-impaired gardening experts Ces and Cyril, kiddie-host Princess Joyce (ever eager to partake of her medicinal "pick-me-up") and the shybut-questing customer-from-hell Bruce who aspires to be everything from a mountie in the Yukon to a private dick. Pythonesque pepperpots Lois and Narelle recounted the tragic misadventures of their unfortunate husbands and arts guru Peter Mascara showered us with segments from his Glitter Time.

For no apparent reason, the first seven editions also included a brief opening message from Aunty Jack, Bill Peach or Buffy Saint Marie before the device was abandoned. From episode eight, the show switched from being an RS/JJ to an RS/ABC production, although all the early editions were also played on regular A.B.C. stations throughout the country when the series was premiered in March 1976 (double-J had to become triple-J FM some years later before being available to listeners outside Sydney).

By the end of its initial 13-episode series **The Naked Vicar Show** had become an Australia-wide success, and the A.B.C. commissioned a follow-up season. To capitalise on the programme's success, EMI Records released an LP of highlights.

In August Reilly and Sattler received a parcel of sketches from an accountant with the N.S.W. Education Department, Doug Edwards and within a week he'd joined the scriptwriting team for the new series.

The second season saw the return of the Vicar, Bruce and the gardeners Ces and Cyril (all of whom could be found in almost every edition), with Chuckle Corner and Glitter Time making an occasional reappearance. Added to the roster were the trendy trio Craig, Val and Geoffrey (who endeavoured to keep up with all that was fashionable and chic) and a couple of irritatingly dotty pensioners who delighted in doing battle with the Social Security, the Police and even P.M. Malcolm Fraser (in a strangely similar fashion to the grotesque creations of Marty Feldman and Tim Brooke-Taylor on Feldman's 1960s B.B.C. series).

With the conclusion of a second 13-episode run, Reilly and Sattler produced **Naked Vicar** revues for theatre restaurants in Sydney and Melbourne, and EMI released another LP of sketch highlights. Next on the agenda was a transfer to television, but overtures from Reg Grundy Productions were rejected in favour of RS retaining control of the enterprise.

Eventually the Seven Network won out over the A.B.C. to screen a series of hour long programmes (which they chose to schedule on an irregular basis over an eighteen month period). The original cast of Brown, Higgins and Golsby was augmented by the addition of radio voice Col McEwan and actress Julie McGregor.

The television format was much the same as the radio version with more lampoons of commercials and series and a Bramston-like news bulletin at the beginning and end of each programme (replacing Higgins' sermon as the Vicar, who was no longer featured). Regulars Bruce, the arty-crafties Craig, Val and Geoffrey and gardeners Ces and Cyril all made the transition and many classic sketches were simply redone in vision.

The Seven editions also saw the introduction of car-worshipper Ted Bullpitt and his wife Thel, who quickly became favourites and eventually spawned their own sitcom Kingswood Country (see LAUGH #15 for an in-depth feature on the series). Another popular segment updated the radio duo of Lois and Narelle, though apart from a brief reworking of the Oath K'Noath routine in their first appearance, the pair were now almost totally different characters. Instead of gossipy housewives, they became a man-hungry typist who relates her romantic misadventures to the office tealady. Taking over the Narelle Hudson role from Ross Higgins, Julie McGregor created one of Australian television's most enduring characterisations and scored a personal triumph.

It was unfortunate that McGregor left the series at the end of the first season following a dispute with the production team (though she subsequently achieved enormous success in writer Reilly's longrunning **Hey Dad** sitcom several years later). She was replaced by Laurel McGowan.

By the end of 1978 (and some twenty-one editions) the writers were eager to devote their talents to production of sitcoms and it was decided to end the series.

The Vicar did have one final hurrah, however, when the A.B.C. celebrated its fiftieth anniversary in 1982. A special one-hour edition was broadcast from the Sydney Opera House with Brown, Golsby and Higgins joined by special guest Graham Kennedy (who had recently starred in the Reilly-Sattler radio series **Graham Kennedy's RS Playhouse**). The Vicar's

Fiftieth Birthday Party concentrated more on satirising politics and the A.B.C. itself than reviving favourite segments, with the only regular characters to reappear being the Craig/Val/Geoffrey trio.

And so **The Naked Vicar Show** retreated into video history to act as a link between **Mavis Bramston** in the sixties and **Fast Forward** in the eighties. And like its predecessor, a commercial video of the better moments is long overdue.

LIFE WITH THE LYONS

HROUGHOUT the 1950s, habitual British radio listeners must have felt strangely disoriented. Twice a week Auntie BBC seemed to hand over the reins to Uncle Sam, as a slick, fast-paced American real-life family sitcom took the air. The stars, Ben Lyon and Bebe Daniels had been leading lights in the early days of Hollywood, appearing separately in many silent and talking feature films.

Bebe, born in Texas in 1901 but living in Los Angeles since childhood, made a more significant contribution to the celluloid art than her husband. Her credits include the musicals *Rio Rita* and *42nd Street*, a series of comedy one-reelers with Harold Lloyd and performances alongside legendary screen lovers Rudolph Valentino and Douglas Fairbanks. Ben was born three weeks after Bebe in Atlanta, Georgia. In 1916 his parents moved to New York, where Ben started in plays and films, the latter taking him to Hollywood. His most famous (or should that be infamous?) rôle was in Howard Hughes' high-budget aviation epic, *Hell's Angels*; later Ben's unrestrained pride in this film was worked into a running joke.

Bebe and Ben were married in 1930. Three years later they paid their first visit to Britain, regularly returning during the 1930s, and this is where they found themselves upon the outbreak of war in 1939. Although as American citizens free to leave, they decided to stay on in blitz-torn London throughout the duration, a decision which endeared them to the British people. They broadcast regularly with Viennese-born Vic Oliver in *Hi*, *Gang!* until Ben joined the U.S. Army Air Force and Bebe went to Normandy as a front-line war correspondent. Meanwhile, their daughter Barbara and adopted son Richard were in the care of Bebe's mother, back in California.

After the war the family was reunited, the Lyon children joining their parents in England. Barbara began studies at the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art, and since young Richard had already made many films in America, Bebe and Ben thought their next radio venture could involve both generations of Lyons. A real-life domestic comedy with the performers presenting comic exaggerations of their own personae was a novelty to the Brits, but had already become a staple part of the American radio diet.

The programme's verisimilitude extended further; action revolved around the Lyons' home in Southwick Street, Marble Arch, their pets Skippy (a siamese cat) and Skeeter (a brown poodle) were brought to life, and authentic incidents provided the writers with ready-written plots. The private and public lives of the Lyons seemed inseparable. The rule still held when the family was extended; both Barbara's first husband and Richard's fiancée were prevailed upon to perform alongside their spouses and in-laws, introducing themselves to the listening millions.

The other regular cast members had more fictional rôles. Bebe decided they should have a Scottish cook — a status symbol amongst movie stars back home — and Molly Weir,



who had been in Tommy Handley's *ITMA* shows, was recruited to play Aggie MacDonald. Fiercely nationalistic, Aggie considered it her duty to put the Sassenachs in their place: "Why don't you eat civilised food like haggis?" — "What does haggis eat?"

Molly found herself in familiar company; also from *ITMA* were Horace Percival as Mr. Wimple, their henpecked neighbour with thirteen-odd children, and Hugh Morton, who appeared occasionally as Ben's boss. Doris Rogers played Florrie Wainwright, the amply-proportioned widowed neighbour, friendly with Bebe but Ben's bête noire. Florrie's entrance was invariably a sign that the dialogue was about to degenerate into a two-way slanging-match.

On top of her acting duties, Bebe also provided the main inspiration behind each script. She would retire to the home's basement room, nicknamed 'The Salt Mines', where she and her two co-writers (Bob Block and Bill Harding, later replaced by Ronnie Hanbury) would furiously draft and re-draft for hours on end. Bebe preferred to work late at night when the house was quieter, and sometimes would not emerge until the following morning.

This perfectionist attitude could be sensed in all areas of production. *Life With The Lyons* was probably BBC Light Entertainment's most rehearsed show. First the writers tested their work on a select gathering of friends and relations. After further polishing, the entire cast would meet at the house to go through their parts together. Another two sessions in the studio and they were ready to face the audience for the episode's ninth run-through! After the broadcast the family could reassess their performances by listening to a tape recording Ben made of every episode.

The fruit of their labours was a warm, cosy and innocent entertainment with wide-reaching appeal, substantiated by their high listening figures. By no stretch of the imagination an example of wit and sophistication, the humour was by and large trite and obvious. Yet one quality they could boast was consistency; an episode from 1951 is practically indistinguishable from one first broadcast a decade later. This in spite of the fact that Richard and Barbara, when first heard teenagers of 15 and 19 respectively, were by 1961 well into adulthood.

Ben was portrayed as a weak and conceited but lovable goofball, ridiculed like George Burns for being supported by a more talented and successful wife. He is also a lily-livered coward, unable to own up to kicking a football through the mayor's attic window. Aggie and the family spare no opportunity to portray him as older than Methusela and tubbier than Falstaff: "Och, treacle pudding isn't good for your stomach, Mr. Lyon. It's thick and fat and bulky" — "Now, don't talk that way about my stomach!"



Bebe was convincingly cast as a Gracie Allen-type dizzy scatterbrain, zealously maintaining an age of thirty-two. A conversation with Bebe is guaranteed to turn anyone into a quivering wreck, even a thug trying to buy her silence after she had witnessed a gangster fight. On the odd occasion she demonstrates an underlying shrewdness, once feigning amnesia to avoid a confrontation with Ben over that greatest of marital crimes, overspending.

For the first six series, the lovely Barbara played a fickle man-crazy romantic, often with a new boyfriend each week. Sensitive to embarrassment from her parents, she was forever warning "If you say that, I'll die — I'll just die!" Barbara also had a successful singing career and her own TV programme, *Dreamtime With Barbara*. This was produced by Russell Turner, who shortly afterwards became her husband, their marriage becoming the subject of the first show of the seventh season. Now the new Mrs. Turner was living in her own home and filling it with plants, much to Russell's disgust ("We ought to call this place 'The Hanging Gardens of Barbara Lyon'"). Regular visits back to Southwick Street to borrow flour, sugar or furniture ensured that Barbara was still involved in the central storylines.

Genial Richard was able to get away with gentle jibes at his mother ('ma'), father ('pop') and particularly his sister, without lapsing into the nastiness of Jimmy Clitheroe in *The Clitheroe Kid*. In turn, he was on the receiving end of jokes concerning his Jack Benny-like stinginess. On radio he was frequently unlucky in love, losing girlfriends through misunderstandings, jealousy and competition from rivals. In the last series however, we learnt of his engagement to Angela Ferguson, who subsequently joined the cast for several editions including the very last, *Roaming Scandals*.

Mid-1952 a stage production of *Life With The Lyons* was presented at the Hippodrome Theatre, Blackpool, directed by showbiz veteran Jack Hulbert. Molly Weir, in the fifth volume of her memoirs, *Walking Into The Lyons' Den*, recounts the horrors which plagued this disastrous enterprise, which also featured sexpot Diana Dors as Richard's girlfriend.

The following year, to celebrate the coronation, the family played second spot on A Gala Programme of Radio Variety

in the presence of the new Queen and Prince Philip. Then in November, for the first time, selected shows were issued for overseas broadcast by BBC Transcription Services.

During the fifth series a new arrival resulted in a little brother for Barbara and Richard, giving the show an added appeal for younger listeners. Robin Lyon, played by 12 year old Richard Bellaers, made his first appearance in the episode titled A Crooner In The House, in which Barbara falls in love with singer Ronnie Harris. Suddenly, without explanation, Mr. and Mrs. Lyon now have three children, their youngest a lively wise-cracking lad with a fondness for unusual pets. Bellaers quickly became a hit, until the seventh series, when his voice broke! Consequently, his part was pared to the bone and he left after the 24th episode;

the following week, in way of explanation for his absence, Ben revealed that Robin was just settling down to life at boarding school.

By this time the entire cast had made several successful forays into the visual media. This began in 1953 with a fastpaced film adaptation of the radio series, reworking items from several episodes including Rocks In Your Garden. The Lyons must convince the landlord of their new house (Hugh Morton) that they are suitable tenants so he will agree to sign the lease. This begins to look less and less likely as Ben rewires the landlord's beloved chandelier to the telephone, floods the basement and Richard upsets his horsy daughter, Violet (Belinda Lee). Meanwhile Barbara falls for a cowboy called Slim Cassidy, who arrives for a dinner party on his horse, and accompanied by a fire-breathing Red Indian chief! A sequel commemorating Bebe and Ben's silver wedding anniversary saw the Lyons in unfamiliar surroundings — motoring around Paris. Ben is suspected of having an affair with a French girl and winds up fighting a duel!

Riding on the back of their big-screen success, *Life With The Lyons* transferred to television during the summer of 1955 (the family had first appeared together on the small screen the previous year). The short run of four fortnightly programmes began with *Ben's Birthday*. After a second series, again for BBC-TV, the team deserted to ITV, making a series of ten episodes for Associated Rediffusion. Even the title was carried over. Amazingly the BBC did not seem particularly upset and continued to produce their radio shows. Another two commercial series followed the family's move from Southwick Street to a new house in Abbotsbury Rd., Holland Park.

Life With The Lyons radio repeats continued throughout the 1960s and picked up some unlikely fans. John Lennon voted it his favourite radio show in 1968 and even named an album in its honour! Meanwhile, the family suffered various setbacks — Barbara and Russell's marriage broke up (Barbara married again in 1968), and Bebe collapsed from a cerebral haemorrhage in 1963. Eight years later she died in London. Ben remarried and in 1979 succumbed to a fatal heart attack on board the QE2 luxury liner, where he was entertaining the passengers with tales from his most remarkable career.

STEVEN WRIGHT

T first glance, the field of American stand-up comedians of the mid-1980s seems a haven for fast talking, primal screaming eccentrics like Bobcat Goldthwait, Howie Mandel and Robin Williams. This might be the case if one overlooked a soft spoken, monotone introvert named Steven Wright, who has attracted big audiences.

To understand Steven Wright, one should examine his routine, which is somewhat of a rarity. He stands on stage, mellow and expressionless, with his head buried close to the microphone. His style of speech is dry and deadpan. Such dullness in presentation hasn't been appreciated since the days of the Bob and Ray duo and Pat Paulsen. Unlike them, however, Wright is totally apolitical and topical gags are not to be found in his act.

His humour is cerebral, based on one-liners about many of our speech and language patterns, which most adults take for granted:

I went to a diner which said 'Breakfast Anytime' so I ordered French toast during the Renaissance.

My girlfriend asked if I slept good ... I said "No, I made a few mistakes".

Often little incidental phrases will elicit howling laughter: Right now I'm having amnesia and deja vu at the same time.

I lost a buttonhole.

And at times, it's not plays on words, but plays on lines that border on the surreal, if not the preposterous:

I have a map of the U.S. that's actual size.


I was once arrested for walking in someone else's sleep.

Wright (born in 1955 in Boston, Mass), played in comedy clubs after graduation from college. He made his first appearance on The Tonight Show in August 1982. Host Johnny Carson liked his act so much he had Steven back in less than a week, an unheard of move for such a new comic. Since then he has been a regular guest on the show, as well as with David Letterman. But it was in 1985 when things really started to take off for Wright. It wasn't his cameo role as dentist Larry Stillman in Desperately Seeking Susan, but sales of his comedy shows. He had his first recording I Have A Pony (on LP and cassette) and an H.B.O. special On Location: A Steven Wright Special (later released to home video).

For the next few years he did stand-up concerts and appeared on three Comic Relief benefits, which evoked enthusiastic responses. He was also proving popular in Britain. In 1988 he starred in a 20 minute movie there called **The Appointments Of Dennis Jennings**, which he co-wrote with Michael Armstrong. It centred on a man who makes several visits to a psychiatrist (played by Rowan Atkinson) and relates a series of bizarre thoughts:

I want to find out who my real stepfather is. My parents won't tell me.

The therapist is cruel and spiteful and makes nasty comments to Jennings, who wants to kill him. The short (subsequently screened on H.B.O.) won an Oscar at the 1989 awards.



Wright continues to appear live in stand-up (he toured Australia in 1994 and 1995), on television and occasionally in movies. Along with the usual talk show appearances, he turns up as a co-worker of Paul Reiser's character on A.B.C.'s Mad About You and as himself in The Larry Sanders Show (starring Garry Shandling).

On the big screen he's played a variety of roles in a wide spectrum of movies. He's participated in the violent Reservoir Dogs, played a lethargic helicopter pilot in So I Married An Axe Murderer, made a cameo in Steve Martin's Mixed Nuts and supplied the voice of turtle Lorenzo Trudgealong in the animated film The Swan Princess:

Friends called me "Speed"

Despite his forays into television and film, stand-up continues to be his favourite medium. And wherever he appears, he maintains the same dullard persona, which continues to delight audiences on three continents.


