Father, Dear Father

N 1968, British commercial television welcomed several new franchises and a plethora of new programming. From Thames came *Father*, *Dear Father*, about a divorcee with two teenage daughters who writes crime novels. Perhaps television's best adaptation of theatrical farce, each episode managed to take a partially overheard conversation or misunderstanding and escalate it into a 25-minute rollercoaster of chaotic situations, before the truth is revealed as the credits roll.

Writers Johnnie Mortimer and Brian Cooke had graduated from scripting such radio shows as *Men From The Ministry*, *Comedy Parade* and the final series of *Round The Horne* and contributing to the TV series *Foreign Affairs*, *Life With Cooper*, *Hughie* and *Horne A'Plenty*.

The starring role of Patrick Glover was taken by Patrick Cargill, a familiar face on the West End stage and to viewers of such classic Hancock programmes as *The Blood Donor* and *The Bowmans*. Daughters Anna and Karen (played by Natasha Pyne and Ann Holloway) are revelling in the swinging sixties with all its music, fashion and ideals of sexual liberation.

Other women in their father's life are literary agent and romantic interest, Georgie (originally Sally Bazely, but later played by Dawn Addams) and the girls' Nanny (Noel Dyson) who has managed the household since the Glover divorce seven years earlier. Also resident on the premises is the pampered St. Bernard, H.G. Wells, played by several canines during the show's run... the first of whom was so large that any form of movement from the couch was apparently a problem.

Helping the plot entangle is Patrick's elderly mother (played by Joyce Carey, usually at the other end of the telephone in Herne Bay), a lady with a distinctly Gracie Allen style of understanding. And prone to dropping by in search of a place to stay or to cadge money is Patrick's ne'er-do-well brother Philip (portrayed by film and theatre great Donald Sinden).


Other occasional visitors are the departed Mrs. Glover (Ursula Howells), now ensconced in Italy, and her new husband, the womanizing Bill Mossman (Patrick Holt in the first couple of seasons, before he was replaced by Tony Britton).

Also seen in several episodes is Karen's accident-prone boyfriend Howard, played by Richard O'Sullivan (who would later star in the Mortimer/Cooke success *Man About The House* and spin off, *Robin's Nest*, which also featured Tony Britton).

Father, Dear Father's performers and Mortimer and Cooke's clever scripts were immediate favourites with British (and soon overseas) viewers who warmed to the befuddled parent's gender and generational problems with his offspring.

After Father, Dear Father had completed two seasons in glorious monochrome, British commercial television and BBC1 joined BBC2 in taping in colour from the second half of 1969. And for four years in a row a short segment featuring the Glovers was featured in the annual ITV All-Star Comedy Carnival screened on Christmas Day.

The Glover clan were also guest contestants on the popular *Golden Shot* game show (March 1 1970) and appeared on the Edward Woodward variety hour (August 4 1971). Cargill starred in his own special, *Patrick Dear Patrick* (January 26 1972) which also featured a *Father Dear Father* segment.



After five seasons and over thirty programmes, the writers thought the show needed a lift and decided that Anna should get married. In the brief span of three episodes she meets, becomes engaged to, and marries Timothy Tanner (Jeremy Child) leading to a final series where the couple move into a flat, and new storylines can involve Patrick and his dunderhead son-in-law.

By 1973, cinema adaptations of television favourites like Steptoe And Son, Till Death Us Do Part, Dad's Army, On The Buses and Up Pompeii! were enjoying enormous box office success. With the TV series now out of production, Mortimer and Cooke decided to hop on the band waggon and reworked storylines from three early episodes into a film version of the show, which was released to cinemas in May 1974.

All the original cast took part (including Sinden, Howells and Carey) though Jack Watling took over as Bill and Jill Melford was cast as Georgie. Richard O'Sullivan reprised his occasional role as Karen's boyfriend (renamed "Richard" in the movie) and Beryl Reid appeared in an amusing cameo.

But the Father, Dear Father saga wasn't quite over. In 1978, Cargill and Dyson were signed to revive their characters in a continuation of the storyline called Father, Dear Father In Australia. The Seven Network, which had become known as the home of ITV comedies downunder (it had also screened the Doctor series, Please Sir!, On The Buses and several lesser known sitcoms) decided to finance a local version of the show.

Mortimer and Cooke scripted the opening episode which saw Patrick temporarily moving to Sydney to write his new novel. Accompanied by Nanny, he is to stay with a previously unmentioned brother Jeffrey who, like Patrick, happens to have two teenage daughters (Liz and Sue). Soon after arrival though, Jeffrey's work sends him to London and Patrick must take charge of the girls (played by Sally Conabere and Sigrid Thornton). And so, for a further thirteen episodes, the generation gap misunderstandings continued as before.

3. Show Me The Way To Go Home

Anna moves to a decrepit bedsit, but Patrick thinks she is living with a man in the luxury apartment downstairs.

While Patrick is looking for a temporary housekeeper to fill in for Nanny, Anna has a computer dating service sending round prospective partners for him.

Comic Relief

N 1976 John Cleese gathered together the cream of the British Oxbridge comedy performers for a series of fundraising concerts in aid of Amnesty International, paving the way for subsequent events *The Mermaid Frolics* and the various *Secret Policeman's Balls* (see LAUGH #8 for details).

In 1981, the cast of *Not The Nine O'Clock News* and performers from London's Comic Strip standup venue appeared in *The Fundamental Frolics* (in aid of Mencap) and, some years later, Stephen Fry organized the first of several *Hysteria!* concerts to raise money to fight HIV/Aids.

The largest ongoing comedy fundraiser has been *Comic Relief* ¹, which began as a comedy equivalent to Bob Geldof's *Live Aid* to help those suffering from famine in Africa. (In subsequent years, the project has also offered financial support to young people in crisis in Britain). One of the co-founders was scriptwriter Richard Curtis, of *Blackadder* and *Four Weddings And A Funeral* fame.

In April 1986 Curtis persuaded his friend Rowan Atkinson, along with Lenny Henry, The Young Ones and many others to take part in three all-star concerts at London's Shaftesbury Theatre. Highlights from the performances were screened on BBC1 three weeks later.

In the years since, the B.B.C. itself has been the focal point for biennial telethons, under the title of Red Nose Day (usually staged in mid-March). Leading comedy, musical and drama performers appear live during the show or in character in specially-produced segments of their original programmes. Others can be seen on the spot in Africa, showing how the money is being spent.

Henry, along with Griff Rhys Jones and Jonathan Ross, were hosts of the marathon programming in the early years, whilst Atkinson can usually be seen in one of the segments (as either *Blackadder*, *Mr. Bean* or one of gallery of Doctors Who). Victoria Wood, Ben Elton, Harry Enfield, Dawn French and Jennifer Saunders have made regular appearances as well (with French's *Vicar of Dibley* team taking part on more than one occasion).

For the 1999 Red Nose Day telecast, Victoria Wood took over as editor of the *Radio Times*, which also included contributions from Dawn French, Rowan Atkinson, Richard Curtis and a number of other *Comic Relief* luminaries.

Apart from the professional entertainment offered during the appeals (as enticement for phone donations from viewers), members of the public are encouraged to wear plastic red noses or take part in a lunatic array of sponsored stunts, such as idiotic dressing or crazy sporting events.

Cash is also raised by the production of books and audio and video highlights of the original concert and the telethons. There follows an itemisation of the events to date and the merchandising...



Lenny Bruce

by Danny Mitchell



ENNY Bruce changed the face of stand-up comedy in America forever, replacing streams of "mother-in-law"-type jokes with insightful observations of American society, and making it possible for comedians like Bill Hicks, Richard Pryor, and even George Carlin to perform. As a reward for his insight and concern, American society treated him like a criminal, denying him his legal and constitutional rights and destroying his life.

Leonard Alfred Schneider was born on 13 October 1925 in Mineola, New York to Myron ("Mickey") and Sadie ("Sally") Schneider, who divorced eight years later. He changed his name to Lenny Bruce because "Leonard Alfred Schneider sounds too Hollywood". He joined the U.S. Navy at the outbreak of hostilities in 1941 and saw action as a shell-passer on the U.S.S. Brooklyn in four (or five) major invasions. After the war his applications to leave the Navy were rejected, so he started wearing a WAVE's uniform. After a panel of psychiatrists had failed to establish that he was a homosexual, the Navy gave him an honourable Section 8 discharge.

About a year later at the Victory Club in Brooklyn, where his mother was dancing, Lenny got his introduction to show business when he was asked to stand in for the M.C. After performing in various amateur nights in nightclubs for about five months in 1946 and 1947, he appeared on a CBS Radio and TV simulcast, *Arthur Godfrey's Talent Scouts*, on the 18th April 1949, performing a routine based on his experiences with theatrical agents, which he later developed into *Adolph Hitler and the M.C.A.* The result was a tie between Lenny and a singer named John Connolly, but it led to more radio and TV appearances.

After a few short shows in New York, he opened at the China Doll Club, New York, in February 1950, in a show that ran for five weeks. A year later, while performing at the Club Charles, he met a stripper named Honey Harlowe (Harriet Jolliffe.) He had by this time committed himself to a three month tour of duty as deckhand on a merchant ship, but on his return he and Honey moved into an apartment together.

In April 1951, in New York, he and "a battery of lawyers" set up a charity called the *Brother Matthias Foundation* for Lepers, whose stated aim was the support of a leper colony in British Guiana. In his autobiography, Lenny makes no bones about the fact that that this was just a way to make a lot of money: "Of course it was dishonest and corrupt, and I don't fool myself by saying there are degrees of corruption..." He kept half of what he collected for his efforts: "It was no more and certainly much less—than the majority of charitable organizations take out for their efforts." A few days later, while "fund-raising" in Miami, he was arrested for vagrancy and panhandling. Despite being able to produce the charter for the foundation, he was taken to court the next day, where he was acquitted.

On 16th June 1951 Lenny and Honey were married in Detroit. For the next three months they performed together in clubs and on TV, but that September they were involved in a car accident in which Honey was horrifically injured, and Lenny received head injuries. He immediately stopped "fundraising", believing that God was punishing him for his dishonesty.

After a few years working clubs mostly in Los Angeles, including an eighteen month engagement at a club called Strip City, Lenny and Honey finished up in Hollywood, working on Lenny's father's chicken farm. In 1954, on the recommendation of fellow comedian Buddy Hackett, Lenny was approached by Twentieth Century Fox and offered work as a script writer; they gave him details of a film they were planning called McCluskey Strikes a Blow, which Lenny developed into The Rocket Man. Although this film was not a success, Lenny was given a writing contract, with Dream Follies (starring Lenny and his mother, Sally) and Dance Hall Racket (starring Lenny, Honey, and Sally) following later in the same year. While researching a film to be called *The Leather Jacket*, Lenny dressed as a tramp and went to talk to Catholic priests in various parts of Los Angeles. Instead of the stereotype priest who'd offer support and assistance to anyone, regardless of their circumstances, he found that priests didn't want to talk to a tramp, and casually brushed him off. From these and similar experiences of hypocrisy in the organised churches he developed the routines Religions, Inc. and Christ and Moses.

Lenny and Honey's daughter Kitty was born on 7th November 1955, though the marriage was by now under strain, with Honey going back to stripping. Lenny filed for divorce in March 1956, though Honey went with Lenny to Hawaii three months later. While in Hawaii Honey was arrested for possession of marijuana, and Lenny took Kitty back to Los Angeles. They were finally divorced in January 1957. Lenny said that he got "about an hour's worth of material [out of the divorce]. Not bad for an eight year investment."

Lenny continued to perform for the next few years, developing a more outrageous style (he appeared on stage naked several times, and was fired after his first night in one venue for doing "blue material"), appearing on *The Steve Allen Show* on NBC, and *Playboy's Penthouse* on WBKB-TV, Chicago,

and releasing several records. Then in April 1960 he gave a performance at the New York Town Hall, which sold out. According to Don Friedman, jazz pianist and long-time friend of Lenny, "[The] Town Hall [was] upset because of copies of Paul Krassner's *Realist* placed in back of seats to greet Sunday morning churchgoers, who did not appreciate the magazine, or us. This was the start of the anti-Lenny campaign."



By mid-1961 Lenny was riding high on a wave of popularity, with four LP's, a short booklet, *Stamp Help Out*, and several films to his name, and filling venues across America. On 29th September of that year, though, he was arrested in Philadelphia for illegal possession of drugs. The police confiscated several medicaments, but analysis by the police chemist confirmed that they were drugs for which Lenny had valid prescriptions, and the case was dropped. The following week, in San Francisco, Lenny was arrested for obscenity for the routine *A Pretty Bizarre Show*, in which he used the word "cocksucker". He was acquitted in March 1962, but used his experiences in court for the routine *Blah Blah Blah*.

In April 1962 he went to London at the invitation of Peter Cook, owner of The Establishment nightclub, where he enjoyed success with over fifty performances, then in September went to Australia. The Australians were apparently less impressed with him than Londoners; he was booked at Aaron's Hotel in Sydney for a week, but was banned after one performance. The ABC had booked him to appear on its program *People*, but they cancelled the booking on the previous day. Press reports were unfavourable, and Lenny returned to the USA after less than two weeks down under.

Three weeks later, in Los Angeles, he was arrested again for illegal possession of narcotics. On his conviction in May 1963, the judge could have sentenced him to two years imprisonment; instead he had him "assessed" by two doctors who (apparently on the basis that Lenny had been arrested on a possession charge, and the hypodermic needle marks on his arms) testified that he was a heroin addict. Lenny's doctors and one of America's most experienced and respected experts on narcotics addiction, Dr. Joel Fort, disagreed. However the judge ruled that Lenny was an addict and ordered that he be confined for treatment for ten years. Lenny appealed, and three years later was given a suspended sentence. (By a curious coincidence, the arresting officer in this case was subsequently imprisoned for "illegal importation of narcotics".)

Two weeks after this, Bruce was again arrested for obscenity and then again a week later (on two successive nights.) This case was dismissed in July 1963, but seemed to set the pattern for what was to come. For the remainder of his life he was repeatedly arrested, once on a narcotics charge (which was thrown out of court) but otherwise for obscenity. That these arrests had more to do with suppressing Lenny's scathing analyses of American society and less to do with the language he used can be amply illustrated:

- after Lenny was arrested in Chicago's Gate of Horn nightclub, a police official visited the venue and warned the manager that the police would have someone watching every show, and that "I'm here to tell you that your license is in danger" (this conversation was recorded, without the police official's knowledge)
- Lenny was never successfully convicted on any obscenity charge (a 1963 Chicago conviction was overturned in 1964, and a New York one a year later was voided in Feb. 1967.) In spite of this, he became known as "the dirty comedian"... Time Magazine called him "the sick comic". The police started arresting him before his shows, holding him long enough to force the shows cancellation, and then releasing him without pressing charges
- this quote from the San Francisco Sunday Examiner and Chronicle, October 31, 1971, p. 30, in an article titled "The Irony Of Lenny Bruce", is perhaps the most telling: "As one of the New York assistant district attorneys remorsefully told Bruce's lawyer, Martin Garbis: 'We drove him into poverty and bankruptcy and then murdered him. We all knew what we were doing. We used the law to kill him.'"

As would be expected, Lenny's shows from this time become more concerned with the law and the legal system, though, to his credit, he never had anything derogatory to say about them or the police, even offering his ideas about why we *need* a police force in a routine called *The Craphouse*.

Lenny was invited back to The Establishment in 1963. He was refused entry to Britain, but flew to Ireland a few days later and entered England from there, but was deported the next day and barred from future visits.

In April 1964 at the *Cafe Au GoGo* in Greenwich Village, he was again arrested for obscenity; two months later, during his trial, a petition signed by some of the leading actors, comedians, writers, philosophers, theologians, and editors of the time (including Woody Allen, Richard Burton, Elizabeth Taylor, Joseph Heller, Lillian Hellman, Walt Kelly, and Allen Ginsberg) was delivered to the mayor of New York, stating that his trial was a violation of the first and fourteenth amendments of the US Constitution. This was the case in which he was convicted.

By October 1965 Lenny had spent so much time and money defending himself that the day after his fortieth birthday he was declared a legally bankrupt pauper. He continued to perform, but on 3rd August 1966 he was found in the bathroom of his home in Hollywood, having died from a morphine overdose.

In an ironic twist, within five years of Lenny's death there were two stage plays based on his life story being performed in New York (one of which was made into a film!)

Ted Ray

N a 1973 interview, the late Barry Took submitted to Ted Ray that he must have made more radio broadcasts than anyone else in comedy. Such a claim would be virtually impossible to prove, but given that Ted had appeared in over six hundred episodes of *Ray's A Laugh* and *Does The Team Think?* alone, it could well have been true¹.

This achievement is all the more impressive considering he did not neglect the other media — films, television and the variety theatre stage were all successful platforms for the Ray wit and charm.

Ted was born Charlie Olden in Wigan, but spent most of his childhood in that comics' breeding ground, Liverpool. His father — in turn, a small-time Lancashire comedian, pub landlord and ship's steward — clearly had a great influence on young Charlie, who was inspired to follow in his old man's footsteps and take up the violin.

His prowess with the fiddle would eventually lead to his first showbusiness bookings, when he joined a local dance band which entertained cinema audiences during the interval between films. As well as scraping the cat-gut, Ted occasionally loosened up the larynx with a spot of crooning, and his little party piece of improvising lyrics to *The Farmer Took Another Load Away* was very well received by the punters.

With characteristic confidence, it wasn't too long before Ted was treading the boards as a solo performer. For his first engagement, he decided to adopt the whimsical name "Hugh Neek", a decision that immediately backfired when a clotheared theatre manager introduced him as "Mr. Hush Week". Patiently waiting in the wings, clad in an old mac, tatty scarf and bowler, Ted was not amused. Later, he toured in musical revues as "Nedlo², the Gipsy Violinist", sporting a sash made from an old table runner and with brass curtain rings dangling from his ears.

But real success still eluded him until he made the momentous decision to discard all the funny clothes and do his act dressed in an ordinary suit. Although practically the norm these days, to see a stage comedian looking like he'd just wandered in from the street was then still a novelty.

Having adopted this everyman character, Hugh Neek soon picked up gigs in London and then acquired an agent, who urged him to take on a new name. Oddly, the snappy one he chose — Ted Ray — already belonged to a former celebrity, namely the winner of the 1912 British Open golf championship.

In the years that followed, Ted's act (a mixture of violin playing and joke telling, which he dubbed "Fiddling and Fooling") improved and he slowly worked his way up the billing and into larger theatres. In 1932 he made his debut at the London Palladium, where much later he was to help his friend Danny Kaye take Britain by storm.

For contractual reasons Ted had to wait until 1939 to make his first broadcast³ and the ordeal almost turned him off radio for life. He put everything he had into his routine for the BBC's *Music Hall* and had just returned to his dressing room, when the producer John Sharman delivered the bad news.



Apparently the recording equipment had broken down during his performance and so Ted was forced to face the audience for a second time and repeat his piece verbatim.

Shortly afterwards Ray was awarded his first weekly wireless show, entitled *Just Fooling*, but the outbreak of war put an end to its run after only one episode. It was ten years before his next series, but this one fared considerably better.

Ray's A Laugh, as it was somewhat cornily christened, was devised by BBC producer George Inns, and featured a talented cast including Kitty Bluett (who had just arrived from Australia) playing his wife, Patricia Hayes (the cockney character actress later better known as Edie Grimthorpe in The Benny Hill Show and Mrs. Cravatte in Hancock's Half Hour) and a young, recently demobbed impressionist named Peter Sellers.

Beginning with a record-breaking initial series of sixty-five episodes, *Ray's A Laugh* ruled the airwaves for an amazing twelve years. Early programmes consisted of Ray's short introductory stand-up (or 'patter' in 1940s parlance) routine, a domestic scene with Ted, Kitty and her brother Nelson (played by Fred Yule) written by Eddie Maguire, and finally, the adventures of 'George, The Man With A Conscience', featuring a host of funny voiced two-dimensional characters and catchphrases by the ton. Musical interruptions came from The Beaux and The Belles (basically The Keynotes from *Take It From Here* rebadged) and sibling harmonists Bob and Alf Pearson ('We bring you melody, from out of the sky — my brother and I').

By 1953 the format had altered significantly. All the oddball characters were insinuated into the middle domestic spot, and the show metamorphosed into an uninterrupted half-hour sitcom. Peter Sellers left after the sixth series (retitled *Ted Ray Time*) to pursue film and television aspirations, and most of the funny voices were taken over by future *Carry On* star, Kenneth Connor. Sellers even pinched a couple of Connor's characters for *The Goon Show*, namely wheezing geriatric Herbert Toil ('you're very rude, ain't ya?') and nasal shop proprietor Sidney Mincing ('do you mind?').

Regrettably there is little pleasure today to be gained by listening to an episode of *Ray's A Laugh*. The over-reliance on catchphrases and scene-setting monologues from the star ('Here I am stranded at Bletchley...') is highly reminiscent of Tommy Handley's old *ITMA* shows and sounds just as dated. In addition, there is something about Ted and Kitty's manner which is more apt to irritate than to amuse.

During the 1950s, Ted appeared in many other programmes, often in the role of compere. For seventy consecutive weeks he hosted *Calling All Forces*, a prodigious variety show aimed at the troops, with film star guests and scripts by bright new boys, Bob Monkhouse and Denis Goodwin. Coronation year saw him presenting special broadcasts featuring the cream of the profession on both radio and television (the latter with cohost Terry-Thomas).

After Ray's A Laugh, Lawrie 'Navy Lark' Wyman wrote an interesting series for Ted, incorporating various sketches centred around a different object each week. As well as delivering one-sided conversations in the Bob Newhart style, Ted played an assortment of unusual character parts, including a mouse, a reindeer and even a ventriloquist's dummy. Later he co-starred with Kenneth Williams (friend of his actor son, Andrew) in *The Betty Witherspoon Show*, a fast-paced pot-pourri of cross-talk, sketches and songs.

But the radio series which occupied most of his time during the sixties and seventies was *Does The Team Think?*. In this show, devised by Jimmy Edwards as a comic alternative to *Any Questions?*, queries posed by members of the audience or a guest celebrity goaded a panel of funnymen into a frenzy of improvised gag-cracking. *DTTT* clocked up over three hundred editions in its twenty year run, and even made a brief transfer to television.

Ted's first major small screen venture was an eponymous series of Saturday 'spectaculars' for the BBC. This mixture of jokes, song, star turns, dancing girls and sketches (co-starring Kenneth Connor as his brother-in-law) was soon competing with Val Parnell's big variety productions over on ITV. By the 1970s he was appearing regularly as a panellist on *Jokers Wild* and as a judge on the talent quest, *New Faces*.

Ray also enjoyed a modestly successful film career, however this failed to really take off due to a stroke of bad luck. In 1959 he starred as the headmaster in the third *Carry On* movie, *Carry On Teacher*. Later that year he took the lead role in *Please Turn Over*, playing a businessman whose daughter writes a spicy novel featuring the whole family. Peter Rogers, producer on both pictures, hoped that Ted would become a regular in subsequent *Carry On* productions. Sadly this proved impossible since he was under contract to another studio. A replacement was sought and so it was that Tony Hancock's sidekick, Sid James, joined the series.

In 1975, returning home from a day of golfing and alcohol (two of his favourite passions), Ted was involved in a very bad car accident. The injuries sustained in the crash had a

debilitating effect on his body and left him dependent on crutches to get about. On 8th November 1977 he suffered a fatal heart attack.

Asked to supply his own obituary in a 1971 edition of *Does The Team Think?*, Ted had suggested the following: "Ted Ray died peacefully in his sleep at 95 years of age in a Brighton hotel. A blonde is helping the police with their inquires."

In reality, it was left to other great British comic talents to pay homage. Kenneth Williams acknowledged an admiration for his geniality and wit, stating "He was a true craftsman and it's a shame he only appeared in one of the *Carry Ons*." Interviewed for a radio tribute programme, Peter Sellers maintained "Whatever I know about timing I learned from Ted."

"Always exit with a good gag" was a golden rule of Ted's, which he applied to life both on and off stage. After his death, a card was found in his top pocket which left the following instructions: "Cremated, and ten percent of ashes to be scattered over my agent."

Anna Russell

'M not making this up, you know!" The lecturer seems slightly taken aback. The audience is rolling about in laughter, having just been told the obvious fact that, near the start of Part Four of Wagner's "The Ring Of The Nibelungs", the hero Siegfried has for the first time in his life met a woman who isn't his aunt. Fortunately, the lecturer in question is Anna Russell (comedienne, soprano, mezzo-soprano, tenor, baritone, pianist, guitarist and autriculatrix extraordinary), and that's exactly the response for which she was looking.

Anna Claudia Russell-Brown was born on 27 December 1911, and raised in London. After her schooling was completed, she went on the Royal College of Music, of which she later said: "If you go there with a tin voice, you'll come back with a loud tin voice." Despite being denied permission to broadcast on the BBC by the College, she slipped in singing folk songs on the BBC Overseas Service.

In Canada during World War II, Anna worked for the CBC, where she progressed from folk songs to old music hall tunes, and finally began writing comedy monologues. After touring with the Toronto Symphony Orchestra, Russell appeared solo at the New York Town Hall in February 1948.

A further show in November 1951, led RCA-Victor to offer her a recording contract. However they wanted a studio recording, so Russell switched to Columbia who were willing to record a live concert version (at New York Town Hall). That first album, *Anna Russell Sings?* presented a range of tunes for singers, whether they be untrained, loud but with no brains, or just plain tone-deaf.

The following year, a further LP included longer parodies. In addition to *Analysis of the Ring Cycle* (which compressed twenty hours of opera into twenty minutes), there was a satire on the kind of introduction one was likely to receive performing to women's musical clubs, and a guide to writing new Gilbert And Sullivan operas.

Anna released her *Guide To Concert Audiences* in 1954, which aimed to demonstrate to the musical amateur what exactly they were listening to. She explained, "An interesting thing is that when you start this experiment you will find that the things that strike you as being the most utterly ghastly are invariably the ones considered by the experts to be the most artistic."

A year later, Russell recorded her *Square Talk On Popular Music*, demonstrating that pop singers had undergone a mental breakdown over the previous thirty years; from the optimistic 1920's style *I'm Feelin' Fine* through mania and depression to schizophrenia (*Maladjusted*, featuring a spot-on Johnny Ray parody) and finally descending into complete raving insanity. Never one to be musically biased, the other side of the LP dealt with madrigals and opera with similar venom.

In 1955 Anna also became an author with *The Power Of Being A Positive Stinker*, conceived as an antidote to the self-help books then flooding the market. However, by following the Russell method, one could end up destitute or in prison. The book included a bonus record which contained two studio tracks hitherto unissued (a third cut from the same session, *Noisy Neighbors*, finally saw the light of day in 1998 on CD).



A tour of South Africa yielded her next LP, Anna Russell In Darkest Africa (recorded at the Johannesburg Music Festival). It features a methodical deconstruction of Verdi's Hamletto: "As you know, Verdi has made operas out of many of the Shakespeare plays. He has not, as a matter of fact, made one out of Hamlet, but I'm not for a moment going to let that stand in my way." Highlights included a Jimmy Durante impression in the "To be or not to be" soliloquy, a demonstration of various types of folk songs, and a lecture on how to assemble and play a set of bagpipes.

The main item from Russell's final Columbia LP (in 1958) was a spurious talk to a convention of banana growers on how to make the public more "banana-prone" through song; also included was a guided tour around the French Horn and a pointed look at beatnik poetry.

Anna continued touring the world, and whilst in the UK in 1962, took a small role in the Terry-Thomas/Eric Sykes film *Kill Or Cure* (her only other film credit was for providing voices in a 1954 puppetry version of *Hansel & Gretel*). In 1965, she performed in the comic opera *Arcifanfano* (and featured on the cast recording).

In the late 1960s Russell moved to Australia and virtually gave up performing for a few years, restricting her appearances to TV chat shows and occasional guest roles. In 1973 she was asked to write a parody of Mozart's Masonic opera, *The Magic Flute*, in conjunction with the opening presentation at the Sydney Opera House. The resultant LP became the first recording made at the venue. Verdi's Babylonian *Nabucco* also came in for similar treatment.

The success of this concert rekindled Anna's enthusiasm for performing, and she left Australia to begin touring again. After a year travelling the world with her Farewell Concert, in 1985 Russell wrote her autobiography — naturally titled *I'm Not Making This Up, You Know* after her famous catchphrase. Anna then retired to live in Canada, in the appropriately named Anna Russell Way.

CDs of her classic performances are still available fifty years after being recorded. As long as there are music lovers in the world, there will always be a subversive element who long to hear the unearthly voice of the self proclaimed "prima donna of the Ellis Island Opera Company".

And I'm not making that up, you know.

Slightly Out To Lunch

N its seventy year history, A.B.C. radio has not been a font of local comedy productions. From the 1940s to 1970s it was content to air dozens of B.B.C. classics from *I.T.M.A.* and *Much-Binding-In-The-Marsh* to adaptations of *Steptoe And Son* and *Dad's Army*.

When it occasionally indulged in bursts of creativity they were often clones of successful British offerings (see LAUGH #22 for an itemisation). The launch of 2JJ in the mid-1970s resulted in several comedy serials and the groundbreaking *Naked Vicar Show* (see LAUGH #14) but by the 1980s, apart from short contributions by such performers as John Clarke, things had returned to the status quo.

In 1984, however, Aunty's decision-makers gave the green light to a project combining the genres of comedy and nostalgia to form *Slightly Out To Lunch* (the name referring to the proposed Sunday lunchtime timeslot). A series of thirteen episodes was commissioned, offering a mix of contemporary television and movie satire, Pythonesque surrealism, several regular characters and a couple of serials. It was all brought together with a flavour of 1930s music supplied by musical director Arthur Greenslade and his Bondi Broadcasters.

The cast and writing team was headed by nostalgia buffs Tony Baldwin (one-time host of A.B.C. radio's Saturday night 78rpm-fest *Sentimental Journey*) and Kevin Daly, whose extensive recording collection of the era would later be used by a number of CD labels. From the acting fraternity came such performers as Peter Whitford, Drew Forsythe and Lance Curtis, along with the writing and performing talents of Angela Webber, Adam Bowen, Jane Hardes and others.

Regular segments of *Slightly Out To Lunch* included the "Cooee Newsreel", anachronistic and often bizarre parodies of those featured on cinema screens before the era of television and "Great Moments From The Cutting Room Floor" with supposed out-takes from film classics like *Casablanca* and *Gold Diggers Of 1934*. Also harking back to movie origins were the serials "It Came From Widgiemooltha" (about a mutant merino which runs amok across Australia) and the *Star Wars*-inspired "Luke Jaywalker And Imperial Echo".

Television commercials and programmes like *Towards* 2000, 60 Minutes and the various other current affairs and lifestyles shows of the day were prime target for satirical treatment, as was the programming lineup of the creatively-impaired Channel 14. Another occasional feature of the series was an incongruous linking of the A.B.C. Sport commentary team heard covering historical events like the Battle of Trafalgar or interviewing Long John Silver.

Perhaps the show's most popular regular was resident vet, Bruce Losis (played by Peter Smalley), whose responses to mundane queries about animals, birds and reptiles often went off into strange psychological flights of fancy. Other characters appearing were radical right wing politician Sir Horace Tuckerbox, interviewer Gillian Cross and arts guru Terry Legiron. And on a number of occasions the musical numbers would feature a newly-written George Formbyesque vocal.

Unlike most comedy shows, *Slightly Out To Lunch* was recorded without the presence of a studio audience¹, which meant it could utilize a large cast of players not all of whom needed to be present at the same session. Unfortunately this lack of response tended to work against the overall success of the series which would have benefited from the contagious effect of audience laughter.

Slightly Out To Lunch also suffered at the hands of A.B.C. programmers (long notorious for their cavalier treatment of imported TV comedies) who would drop occasional editions in certain states when this conflicted with weekend sporting coverage of test cricket or the like. Possibly to make amends for these annoying pre-emptions, five specially-compiled highlight editions of the show were broadcast four months after the conclusion of its first season of programmes.

Six weeks later, on Christmas Day, a special festive edition called *Slightly Out To Christmas Lunch* was aired across the nation with targets being Prime Minister Bob Hawke, the Three Wise Men and Santa's elves. The Cooee Newsreel covered yuletide activities around the globe and Pet's Corner received a plaintive plea from one young listener trying to save his turkey from ending up part of the Christmas dinner.

The merchandising arm of the A.B.C. then decided to get into the act by releasing an LP of first season highlights as a prelude to a second series of programmes, which began in March 1985.

Thirteen episodes later (in some states, anyway) and *Slightly Out To Lunch* had run its course. Though never achieving the acceptance or financial success of its predecessor *The Naked Vicar Show* in being adapted for television, it possessed an interesting degree of wit and creativity.

By the mid-1980s Australian TV comedy was being aimed at a much younger demographic than something relying on the nostalgic echoes of 1930s music and movies ... it was an era that would increasingly depend on university graduates and observational standup from comedy clubs.

¹ Other examples of audience-free comedies included a handful of 1950s B.B.C. radio shows like *Bedtime With Braden*, *In All Directions* with Peter Ustinov and Peter Jones, and Eric Barker's *Just Fancy*. Later attempts include Ronnie Barker's *Lines From My Grand-father's Forehead*, most of the Monty Python LPs and Stephen Fry's *Saturday Night Fry* in the late 1980s.
